PEACE TRAIN CANADA (PTC) PROJECT DESCRIPTION (Nov 12)

PTC GOAL:

To Get Peace Back on Track in Canada.

The Peace Train project is not a protest but an effort to lift up all those who will rise to the current global challenges of resisting polarization, rampant self-interest, and an industrial war machine that is out of control.

In the face of ever-increasing violent wars, nuclear threat, climate disruption, and humanitarian crisis, the Peace Train, "sounding louder," raises the voice of Canadians across the country committed to the basics of enduring stability, security, and human rights both here and abroad.

We have an honorable history of peace efforts in Canada, going back to 1957 and Lester Pearson's Nobel Prize for helping create the first UN Peacekeeping force. In 1992, Canada contributed 3,825 personnel to UN peace operations. Today, only 17 military personnel are deployed out of 62,000 uniformed peacekeepers. The federal government progressively withdrew support for the Pearson Peacekeeping Centre until its final closure in 2013.

PTC VISION:

That Canada becomes an independent, middle power that is invested in and committed to promoting a culture of peace and resisting the culture of war

THROUGH:

- Recognizing Canada's historical and present involvement in injustice, colonialism, and asymmetrical power structures, here and abroad, and working towards true reconciliation;
- Identifying the underlying causes of violent conflict;
- Upholding the UN Declaration of Human Rights: the basics of justice, equality, freedom, security, and well-being for all, as essential for preventing violent conflict and war;
- Expanding Canada's role in United Nations peacekeeping, the development of international law, and the International Court of Justice: creating the conditions for preventing war, deescalating violence, resolving conflict, and postwar reconciliation and rebuilding; and
- Prioritizing open and informed public and parliamentary debate on complex issues of peace, disarmament, and the prohibition of nuclear weapons.

PTC ASK OF GOVERNMENT:

That the Canadian government establish and fund a Centre of Excellence for Peace and Justice focused on research, education, and training in conflict resolution, diplomacy, and peace operations for Canadian civilians, police, military personnel, and the international community. This request will come before Parliament as a petition.

The PTC Parliamentary e-Petition closed on November 8 with 1012 signatures. It has been officially approved for presentation to the House of Commons.

SYMBOLISM:

The Peace Train and the forty Peace Trainers climbing on board are taking a symbolic journey on an iconic train. Although the train is part of our colonial past but it is also a single track that unites this great land. The Peace Trainers represent thousands of others who, although they cannot ride on the train, support it in spirit and in many diverse ways.

The PTC logo is a white train billowing white steam. The spirit train is on a brilliant UN blue background, linking it to the Universal Declaration of Human Rights and Canada's responsibility within the UN to protect those basic rights and freedoms.

The many cars that comprise PTC are seen to represent the many exemplary organizations who have worked tirelessly promoting and protecting the basic elements of peace and justice.

PRAGMATISM:

Peace Train Canada has a two-pronged approach to its goals:

- 1. The first is to generate and focus public support through the magnetic nature of the Peace Train journey, the big kick-off event in Vancouver on November 14, the vigils at train stations across the country (including Toronto and Ottawa), the petition to government, the PTC panel discussion on Nov 22 and the PTC Parliament Hill Rally on November 23rd.
- 2. The second prong is meeting personally with MPs to set forth our case. There will also be a multi-party MP reception on Nov 20th including speaker, Walter Dorn. This effort will help prepare the ground for our government's response to the PTC paper and e-petition presentations to the House of Commons in Parliament.
